Annual General Meeting Reports to Members & Friends 2021/22

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From the CEO

Once again, this last financial year was a mix of predicted challenges and unexpected surprises. The new team in Bunia, DR Congo has established well since the tragic passing of Mozart Kile and the schools are operating as usual thanks to ongoing support of sponsors and donors.



As a brief overview, we have Bwikaragye HOPE School remaining in serious need of support but Kabuga HOPE Secondary School has been blessed amazingly with great support from generous donors. Their heart and commitment for rapid progress with this new school development, we see as a miracle, an answer to prayer. It is exciting to note that the school has now been registered with it's own examination centre. Deeply appreciated is the great effort by the head teacher Agaba Emmanuel in establishing the new Vocational Courses, Science Laboratory and Library. This work is also made possible by the project administrator Kenny Tusingwire and director Kaazi Twinomujuni. Their constant flow of emails, WhatsApp messages and photos creates an excellent platform for informed work and progress, especially as we have been unable to visit the projects due to COVID restrictions.

COME Uganda Hope Schools continue well and their work in Mulago Hospital through COME Hospital care has 15 volunteers who provide care for patients in need of support and help. Amari Community Development project in Northern Uganda is moving ahead with the commencement of a class of secondary students.

It has been a privilege to receive donations for emergency food relief which was distributed by all HOPE partners to thousands of people in desperate need. As the destructive impact of severe COVID lockdowns eased, a new influence is now being felt, that is the impact of grain supplies from Ukraine. The Horn of Africa is being impacted greatly and starvation, combined with 2 years of drought, is now taking it's toll particularly among the Karamojong in NE Uganda. Jono and Ann Osborne's ministry is getting truckloads of maize through to known contacts for distribution to the most needy.

Our base Jambo Sana in Nairne South Australia grows busier each year. Our small office capably coordinated by Ros Morgan progresses well, and the Sponsorship and Project Documentation role is now filled by Susan Davey whom we welcomed in as she replaces Sandra Bamhare after her years of appreciated service. The rest of our team are volunteers under Norma Osborne's leadership to keep the shop and cafe running smoothly. We value them all for a great job being done!

Currently we move our key focus to the Nakivale HOPE School for raising funds to expand the school to accomodate more local and refugee children who still wait for a chance to be educated. Our partner RWC-Children's trust directed by Willy Tumwine and competently administered by Ivan Kato, oversee this great school in a remote and challenging environment.

RWC is a story of expansion all around. Willy Tumwine's church organisation has grown to over 200 churches spreading right across Uganda. Through this ministry, human needs are uncovered and that is where our partner work is crucial to bring lasting hope.

Areas of current work have included ...

- The rescue and rehabilitation of street kids
- Two women's groups making crafts and beads for income
- A safe house for girls rescued from dangerous and vulnerable situations
- A widows sponsorship program for meeting basic needs and business start up
- Emergency food relief distributing 10 tonnes of maize flour to 1000 people
- Child sponsorship program for 99 orphans and needy children
- HOPE Schools educating 1,513 needy children



Packed classrooms are a hallmark at Nakivale HOPE Primary School. Classrooms need to be doubled as the Refugee camp keeps taking in refugees from conflicts in neighbouring nations. Another urgent need is for teachers quarters to be constructed. New latrines are urgent also to cater for the swelling numbers of eager children determined to have a future freed from war and poverty.

 New latrines for teachers, staff and girl students in Nakivale HOPE School
 Additional classrooms for Nakivale HOPE School
 Expand vocational Course training opportunities at the House of HOPE Safe House
 Support the reconstruction of the church building in Mbarara (not tax deductible)

Christian Victory Ministries

Western Uganda*

Years of Partnership: 16 yrs



Our partnership with CVM during 21/22 has been intense and very progressive with almost daily communications to keep up with development work. It all started with storm damage to a main building at our secondary school project and after putting out a call for urgent help, a season of multiple building works commenced.

In summary we have rebuilt an offices/classrooms/lab block and a boys latrine, built an enclosed open air girls bathroom/clothes drying area, another boys latrine, a boys dorm, a double vocational classroom and office block, commenced a kitchen/dining/multipurpose hall and funded equipment and registration for a Vocational Training section. This is all to cater for hundreds of new secondary students.

We deeply appreciate the work and dedication of Kaazi and Kenny as well as secondary Head Teacher Emma whose commitment to HOPE Primary School graduates to receive a quality secondary education is outstanding. The best is yet to come.

Kibogo and Kyambwoma HOPE Schools continue to flourish and Bwkaragye HOPE School now educates well over 350 remote village students.

Future Goals.

Build teacher's quarters at all HOPE/CVM schools.

Finish all unfinished school structures at the secondary (as above) and primary and nursery schools.

Increase child sponsorship numbers as a matter of urgency.





COME Uganda

Lugala, Uganda.*

Years of Partnership: 19 yrs.

Nearly 600 children attend COME HOPE Schools with education as a major source of hope for these eager learners. As well as these children, 85 youth have or are progressing through secondary education in Kampala.

With 42 churches associated with COME (not tax deductible), an active women's craft group called Zaabu, and emergency food and medical relief work, the well trained team in the Lugala base are kept busy and doing well. Frank and Michele Heyward are spending more time in Australia but directing the projects more remotely.



A shining light of COME's work is the Hospital Care Project with a great team of 15 dedicated volunteers who help with crucial gaps in the Mulago Hospital, Kampala's main hospital. Their work centres around meeting needs of patients in poverty or abandonment. Bathing, feeding, transporting, assistance in emergency administration and sharing God's Love. Shantal Akumu (centre front) capably leads this crucial work.

Future goals.

Improve the grounds at HOPE Schools including Kasengejje Nursery and Primary School with paving throughout the compound.



Amari Community Development Organisation

Director: Marita Simpson, Buliisa, NW Uganda.

Years of Partnership: 9 yrs.



Secondary Students

Despite some personal challenges for Marita, the Amari Project continues to progress and develop well. The two very smart girls to left are a sample of around 40 students now attending the Amari Christian Secondary School at the Amari base near Buliisa.

The school is now accomodating 329 students from Nursery class upto S2 (Yr 9 Secondary).

A church for boarding students also operates at the school base as well a medical clinic.

During this last financial year, the first block of two classrooms and offices was completed and a second block of rooms for the secondary school was commenced.

Amari continued to provide urgent and emergency medical care and food relief to those nearby in desperate situations. Around 100 families and individuals were beneficiaries of this timely support.

Future Goals.

Amari team aims to complete the construction of Secondary School blocks two, three and four as well as boys and girls dormitories. Each year the secondary will take in new students as classrooms and facilities become finished.

This will offer graduating grade students a great opportunity to advance with their education in a great environment.



Lower Primary Students

Hope and Care for Little Souls

In this financial year the HOPE complex Schools (nursery, primary and secondary) in Bunia, DR Congo, have continued to operate well with a new team following the passing of Founder Mozart Dino Kile in 2020.

Pictured are students enjoying an annual meal and remembrance service for Pamela Birks. Her passion for the future of children in Ituri, DRC, led to the foundation of the HOPE School projects in Bunia with Mozart Kile forging the schools development.



While some administrative/legal challenges remain following Mozart's passing, the main area of education of the children and youth moves ahead well. This is a credit to the new administration, Steve Schoemaker and Dr Kile who work towards seeing other projects taken up and recommenced. This includes the much needed bridge over the River Shari connecting Bunia town and the secondary school and surrounding community.

A new development is the association of HCLS and an underfunded organisation that cares for 54 orphans and

abandoned children. HCLS is providing food, soaps, washing powder, nappies, mats and towels. As these children grow we hope to see them move into the HOPE Complex School for an ongoing quality education.

Future Goals.

Build a new latrine at the Primary School section.

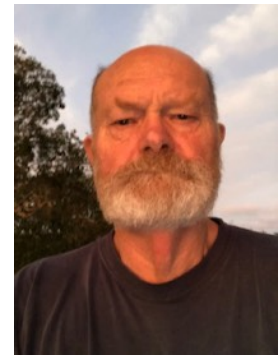
Repaint and repair the secondary school classrooms and buildings.

Since her first trip to Kenya in 1997 with her husband, Sally Lockwood (pictured left) has dedicated her life to the mission work of feeding, clothing, sheltering and importantly educating the children to the highest possible standard. 30 children and youth attend school thanks to the MCCMI project, with more graduating in vocational courses and other professions like Japheth (pictured below), graduating in medicine and now a practicing intern.

In year 20/21, work completed significant refurbishment of the Children's Home and stabilising both main buildings and repainting, as well as repairs to their base buildings in urgent need of some work.

The project was successfully re-registered as a Children's Home by the Government of Kenya, one of the very few to achieve that.

1. Continued education of children through new Primary, Junior High, Senior High curriculum and Colleges / practical training.
2. Accept and nurture new children into Mercy Children's Home.
3. Develop a process to integrate other children into value adding places in the Kenya workforce.

HOPE Missions

Jono and Ann Osborne

(Not Tax Deductible, except for Emergency Relief Funds)



At present we are based in Kampala, attending a local church, preaching in various places and continuing with whatever ministry God puts before us, and awaiting the approval of Ann's visa. I am also very busy studying with Tabor online for my Bachelor of Theology. Also hot off the press is the news that in Feb 2023, our family will be expanding to 4!

We are thankful to God for the **completion of the Bible School** in Kyaka 2 Refugee Camp. It was touching to see the students' eagerness to learn and their gratefulness for having the opportunity to study. Despite their combined grief at the atrocities that are being carried out as we speak against many of their family members in D R Congo, they managed to press on and stay focused, which is admirable. We conducted their graduation ceremony which was filled with great joy and celebration as 46 students received their certificates. It was also great to have Pastor Phill from Australia to be a part of the day.

We also thank God that the Bible school students from Arua finally had their graduation ceremony, having waited a long time for their certificates to finally arrive.

FUTURE MINISTRY BASE IN ATIAK, NORTHERN UGANDA



After purchasing land for a ministry home base and farm in Northern Uganda, we have been able to fence the land as well as dig a dam, a well and build a small 2 room house for storage and security plus we are now able to run our cows on the new land. We are also about to dig a well for the community, as they have been travelling long distances in dry season for water. Our aim is to be a blessing to our new community as well as being a part of it.

Other activities have included further **emergency food relief**, this time in the Karamojong region where hundreds are dying from starvation. This current crisis has been a result of two years of drought and the war in Ukraine that has caused a world shortage of grain.

Jono and Ann are so grateful for the prayers and financial support of friends for their ministry in Uganda.



Child Education Sponsorship



AHI has many stories of children sponsored in the early 2,000's and today as adults are running businesses, working in various professions and improving their communities.

Child sponsors have been amazing in their ongoing support, some over many years, allowing scores of children from poverty to enter higher education or small business opportunities, and finally become self sufficient.

605 children are now sponsored with the impact of COVID on the culture and lives of ordinary Ugandan families creating a drop in overall number of children sponsored. The real stability in African children's lives is education in a caring school environment. We are grateful for ongoing sponsorship support that empowers our HOPE Schools to continue to be there for African children.

With all children back in school, we have seen the closure of dozens of schools after

COVID lockdown. This is because without child sponsorship, many schools do not survive and have been sold off for other purposes and industries.

Thankyou to all child sponsors that achieve so much for your child, but also for their school's survival and viability.

HOPE School Class Sponsorship

The number of HOPE School classes sponsored remains at 34. This regular support makes happy teachers as many schools in Uganda fail to pay teaches their full salary and on time. Our goal remains to get more than one sponsor per class so we can add essential books and equipment to classes.

We thank each class sponsor for their faithful contribution that touches so many children and makes their education possible and great opportunities for a brighter future.





Widow sponsorship

Poverty in Africa causes many families to break down, usually as a man abandons his wife and children after being overwhelmed with the unmet challenge to provide for them. When a woman/mother is abandoned or widowed, she and her children are 'chased' (forced out) from their accommodation and land. This is where our partners take up the chance to provide care from our sponsorship support.

\$60/month is an enormous help for these woman and many are able to eventually use this cashflow for starting a business as well as better caring for their children.

Many thanks to all our widow sponsors and we hope more will take up this beautiful act of sharing and empowering.

Jambo Sana - a touch of Africa

2021/22 was a very fruitful and happy year for Jambo Sana. The cafe has been busier than ever before and financially we saw a 14% increase in net sales of coffee, food and crafts. "There is so much love in this place"

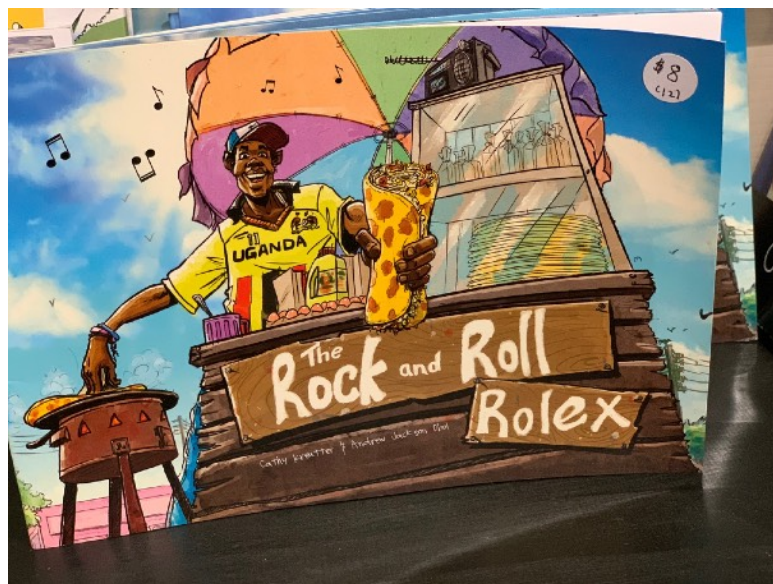
"These pasties are definitely made with love"

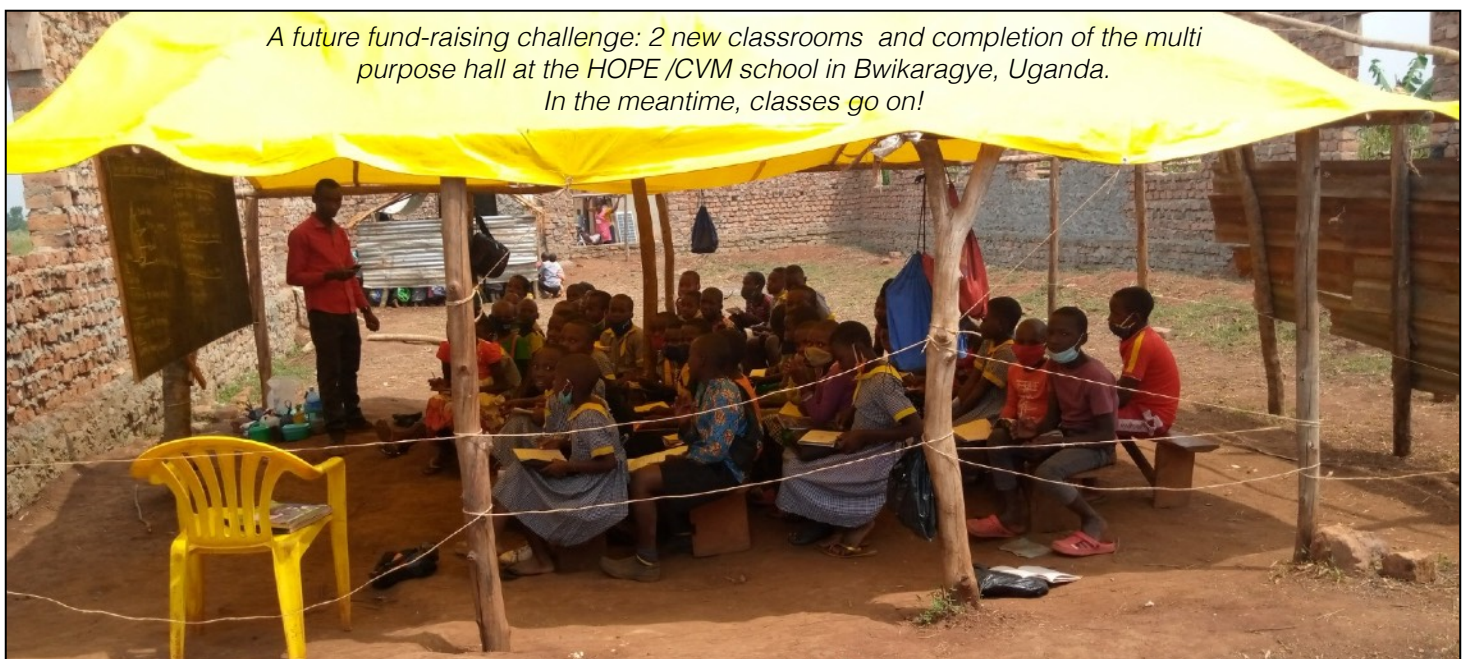

- Fundraising Partner Emergency Food and Flood Relief - \$76,332

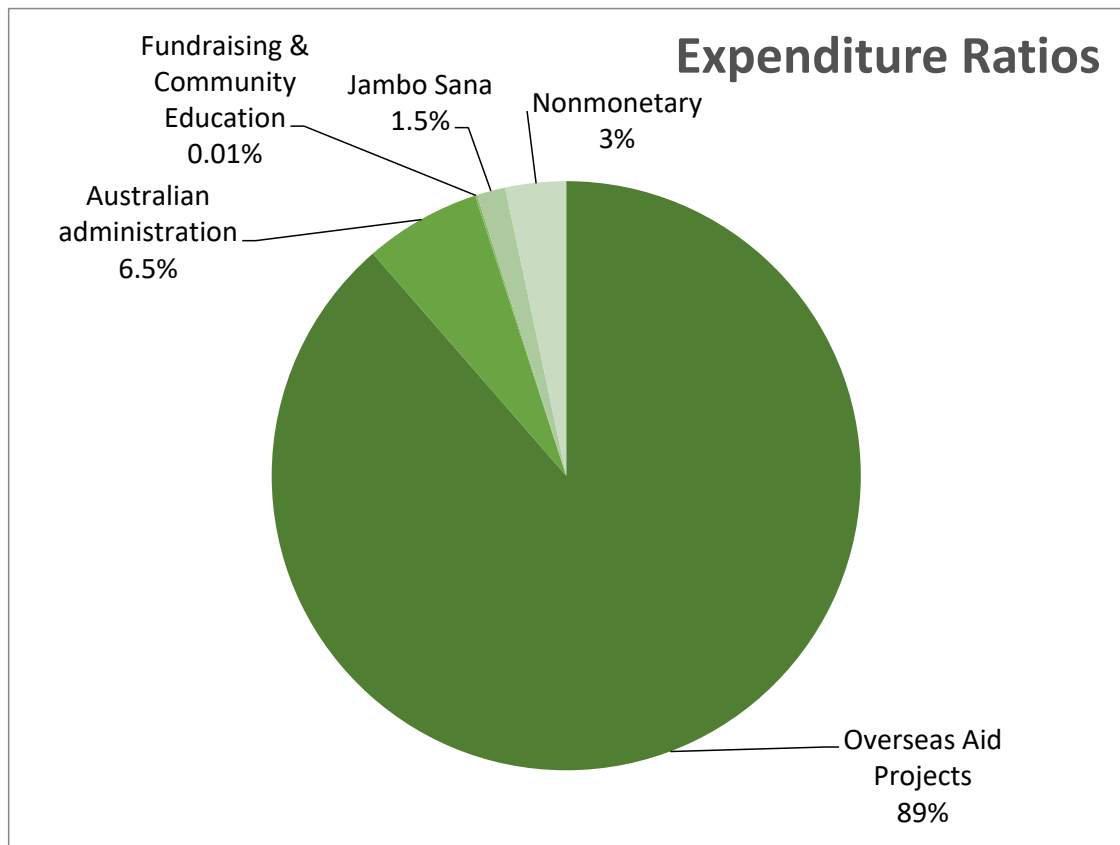

“Fundraising expenses” includes costs of events fundraising and show stalls.

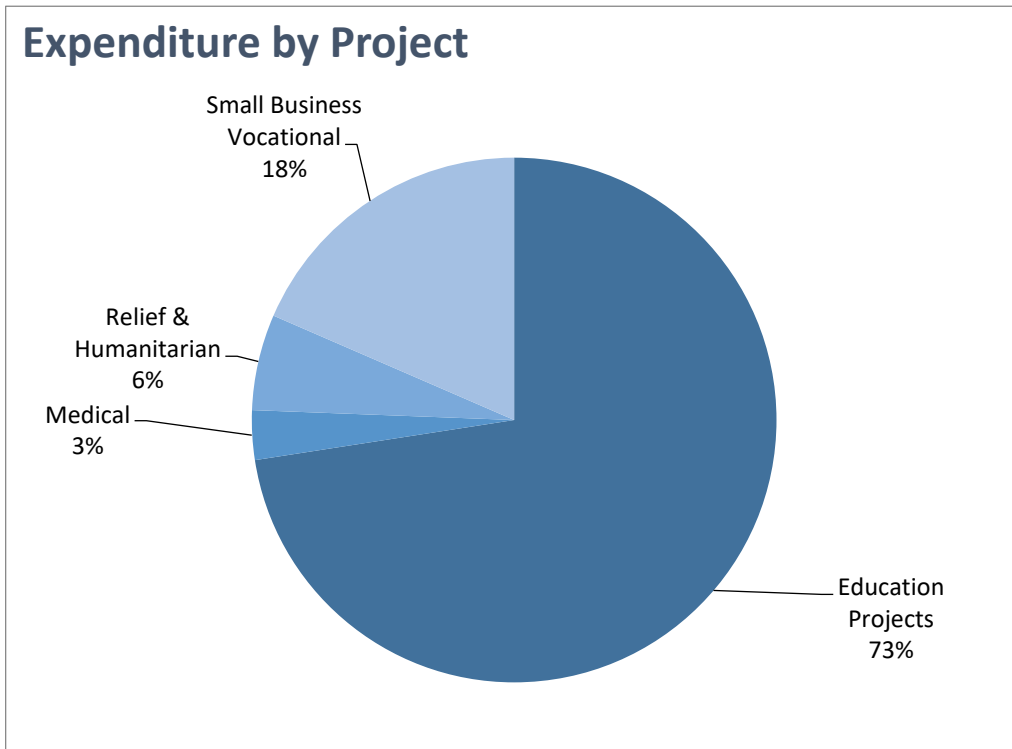
“Community Education” includes costs of newsletters, signage and professional directories.

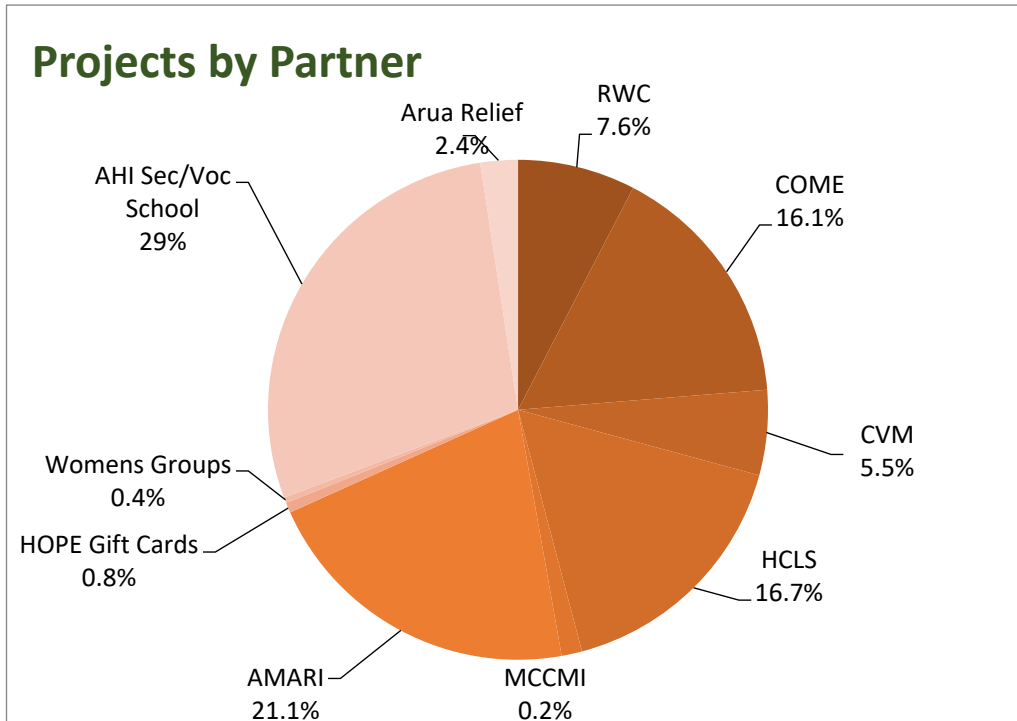
“Jambo Sana” expenses include operating costs of services, food, equipment and artefacts.

AUSTRALIA HOPE INTERNATIONAL INC. NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

Note 1 – Summary of Accounting Principles

This special purpose financial report has been prepared for distribution to the members to fulfil the Board's financial reporting requirements. The accounting policies used in the preparation of this report, as described below, are consistently applied except as otherwise indicated, and are, in the opinion of the Board, appropriate to meet the needs of members.

- a) **Basis of Accounting**
The financial report has been prepared on the historical cost basis of accounting and the going concern assumption.
- b) **Reporting Entity**
The requirements of Accounting Standards and other professional reporting requirements in Australia do not have mandatory applicability to Australia HOPE International Inc. because it is not a "reporting entity". In the Association's opinion, there are unlikely to exist users who are unable to command preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs from these accounts. Therefore this "special purpose financial report" has been prepared solely to meet the Australia HOPE International Inc. accountability requirements.
- c) **Income Tax**
The members believe that the Board is exempt from income tax
- d) **Recognition of Income and Expenses**
Donations and sponsorship income given by donors for specific projects with a specific partner are recorded as income HOPE Project Partner Funds in the Profit and Loss. This income, such as for child education sponsorship or school building income, is received on the expectation that it will be received and allocated to the agreed project in its entirety. In this regard Australia HOPE International Inc. acts to receive and forward such income direct to the partner who will expend the income on the agreed project. As such Australia HOPE International Inc. is clearly committing these funds as liable to the agreed project and partner as detailed in the Balance Sheet.

General fundraising, non-specific donations and purchases of assets are recorded by Australia HOPE International Inc. within the Profit & Loss statement. The allocation of these funds will be determined by Australia HOPE International Inc. management to priority project areas in need and to ensure administration costs are met.

e) *Property, plant and equipment*

Plant & equipment is brought to account at cost and expensed at the time of purchase, except for in the case detailed below.

Items of property, plant and equipment relating to the Jambo Sana Tearooms/Office are initially recorded at cost, and all such assets having a limited useful life are systematically depreciated over their useful lives in a manner that reflects the consumption of their economic potential.

Opinion

We have audited the Code of Conduct Summary Financial Report, being a special purpose financial report of Australia HOPE International Inc. (the Entity), which comprises the Balance Sheet as at 30 June 2022 and the Profit and Loss Statement for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and Statement by Members of the Board.

In our opinion, the accompanying Code of Conduct Summary Financial Report presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Entity as at 30 June 2022, and its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the financial reporting requirements of the fair presentation framework. 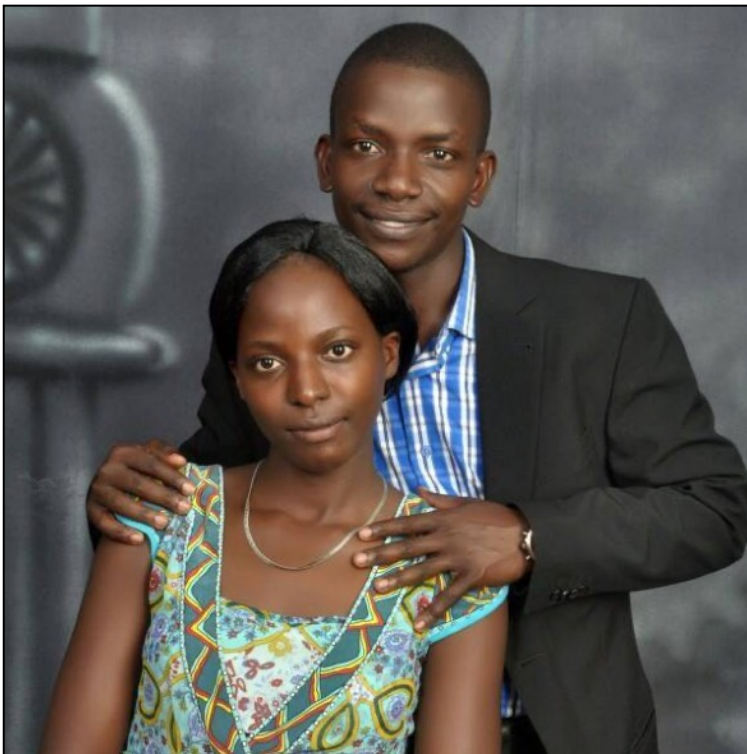

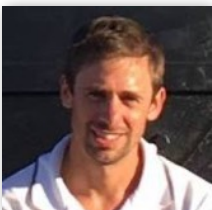
